The information within this book has been collected from many hours of research through old city directories, newspapers, historians, fellow diggers, and collectors. The addresses and dates listed for the various Druggists & Pharmacists are what have been found through research. Some of these businesses were in operation for a greater span of years than have been listed in this book, but through research I was unable to positively document that. Some businesses may have chosen not to pay for listing in the city directories or newspapers, which may account for the gaps in years of operation. Some druggists / pharmacists may also have had business locations other than what are listed within, that I haven't discovered through research.

The numbering sequence of bottles in this book has been kept from the printed format of my first book, to not cause confusion with collectors referring to that edition. For that reason, you'll see some bottles in this book, not shown in numerical alphabetical order. I haven't tried to document and record all the various sizes that each example was available in.

The rarity rating in this book is based on the quantity of the bottle found in collections while conducting research for this book. Some collections studied were from diggers that covered a wide area of Ogden. Other diggers covered a limited area for their finds. Also used for rarity ratings, are some large collections of Ogden Bottles, where the collector searched every avenue to obtain these Ogden Druggist & Pharmacist bottles for their collection.

One collector that contributed a great deal of information and research toward making this book possible was Stan Sanders. He purchased and traded heavily with the diggers and other collectors obtaining an example of most of the rarest bottles, he had duplicates and large quantities of many examples...thank you Stan

Some of these bottles and / or variants are so rare that not one single collection contained them all.

I thank all the many people that have contributed to this work and provided me pictures from their collections, for current and future collectors to reference and enjoy. Also, Rick Holt deserves a big thanks for all he's done to promote bottle collecting in Utah and posting this book to **The Utah Collector website**.

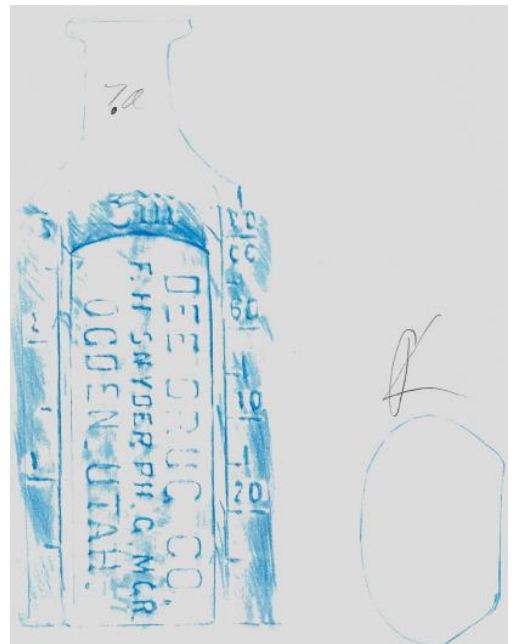

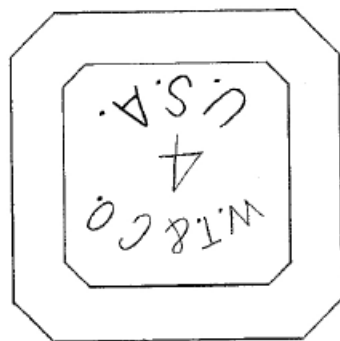
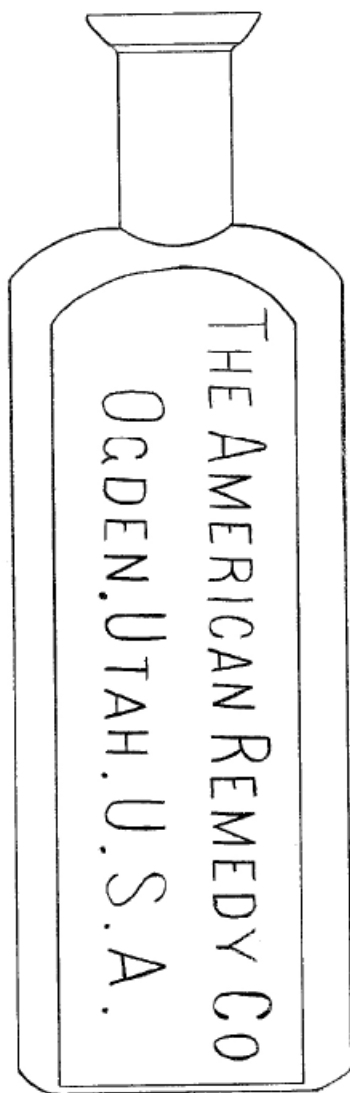

The capital stock is \$10,000. 1,000 shares of \$10 each.

Stock was subscribed by a number of citizens; and the following officers were elected:

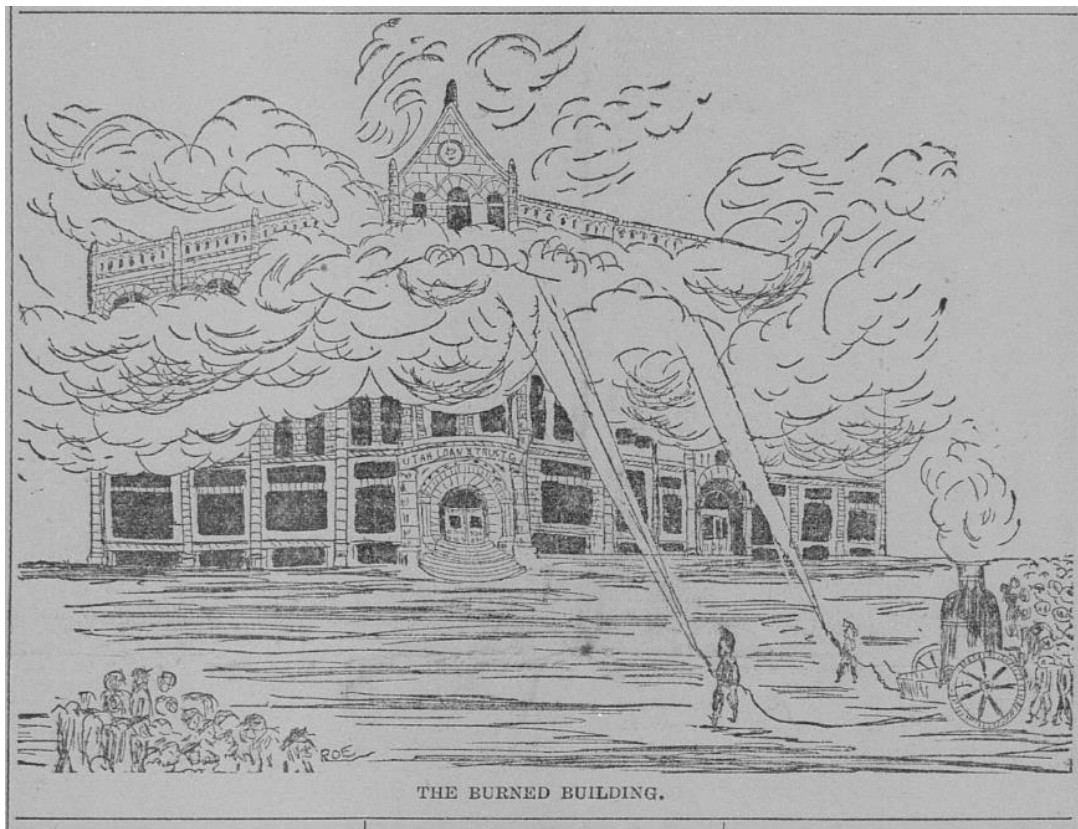

THE BURNED BUILDING.

**DEVASTATION AT OGDEN.**

Two Hundred Thousand Dollars' Worth of Property Destroyed.

**FIREMAN FATALLY HURT.**

The Utah Loan and Trust Company Building a Mass of Ruins.

Bungling Work of an Inefficient Fire Department—Salt Lake Firemen Go to the Rescue—Scenes and Incidents—Losses and Insurance.

OGDEN, March 14.—The most disastrous fire which Ogden has ever had, this morning totally destroyed the magnificent office building of the Utah Loan and Trust company and its contents, entailing a loss of fully \$200,000; insured for \$87,300. The ruins tonight present a very desolate appearance and are being inspected by thousands of citizens.

Old Corporations Cease to Exist—County Clerk Samuel G. Dye has been advised by Governor Spry, through the secretary of state, that the corporate powers and charters of a number of Ogden corporations have been revoked on account of their failure to pay the state corporation tax. According to the law the corporations are granted until July 1 to pay the tax and costs and be reinstated. The corporations are: Adams & Kiesel Co., Adams Nursery Co., Alpine Mining Co., Alice Mining Co., American Remedy Co., American Mining & Milling Co., Anderson Pressed Brick Co., Arcturus Gold Mining & Milling Co., A. # BY THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF UTAH A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, By an Act of the Legislature of the State of Utah, entitled "An Act creating annual license taxes payable by all domestic and foreign corporations in this State, with certain exceptions; providing for penalties and forfeitures and the enforcement thereof, and for the revocation of the charters of domestic corporations falling to comply with the provisions of this act," etc., approved March 22, 1909, and found in Chapter 106, Laws of Utah, 1909, it is provided that all domestic corporations (except corporations not organized for pecuniary profit, and all religious, charitable, benevolent, and all corporations organized for educational purposes, and all private water corporations organized for culinary purposes, and furnishing water exclusively to members of such corporations, and all canal and irrigation corporations engaged exclusively in furnishing water to or for lands owned by the members thereof, all water users' associations organized to comply with the rules of the United States Reclamation Service, and all insurance corporations) and all foreign corporations hereafter engaging in any business within this State, before engaging in, or before continuing to transact business after the 15th day of November, 1909, shall procure a certificate from the Secretary of State of this State authorizing such corporation to engage in, or to continue to transact its corporate business within this State, and each of the corporations aforesaid, not coming within the exceptions hereinbefore stated, shall pay to the Secretary of State a corporation license tax as follows: All corporations with an authorized capital stock of \$10,000, or less, \$5.00; with an authorized capital stock of more than \$10,000, and not to exceed \$25,000, \$10.00; with an authorized capital stock of more than \$25,000, and not to exceed \$50,000, \$15.00; with an authorized capital stock of more than \$50,000, and not to exceed \$75,000, \$20.00; with an authorized capital stock of more than \$75,000, and not to exceed \$100,000, \$25.00; and with an authorized capital stock of more than \$100,000, and not to exceed \$150,000, \$35.00; and with an authorized capital stock of more than \$150,000, and not to exceed \$200,000, \$40.00; with an authorized capital stock of over \$200,000, \$50.00; and

Whereas, It is provided in said Act in Section 3 thereof, that the corporate license tax therein provided for shall be due and payable to the Secretary of State at his office on the 15th day of November in each year; and

Whereas, It is provided in said Act that any corporation required to pay the license tax therein provided refusing or neglecting to pay the same on or before noon of the 15th day of December following the 15th day of November, when such tax was payable, shall be deemed to be in default, and for such default there shall be added to the amount of tax a penalty of ten dollars, and unless such tax and penalty shall be paid on or before the first Monday of April following, the defaulting corporations shall by reason of such default forfeit to the State of Utah the amount of the tax and penalty aforesaid, and shall likewise forfeit its right to transact any business within the State, and the tax and penalty may be collected as hereinafter provided, and

Whereas, In obedience to the provisions of Section 5 of Chapter 106 above mentioned, the Secretary of the State of Utah did, on the 15th day of March, 1910, file with the Governor of this State a complete list of the names of all such defaulting corporations together with the amount of license tax and penalties remaining unpaid, as follows:

## HON. WILLIAM DRIVER, PIONEER DRUGGIST, SEEKS REST.

Came to Ogden Thirty-six Years Ago  
and Has Ever Since Been One of  
Ogden's Foremost Citizens.

Hon. William Driver, the pioneer druggist of Ogden City, today retires from active business life and is succeeded in the business by his son George.

Mr. Driver came to Ogden in the year 1869 as manager of the drug business of Godbe & Company. In 1871 he formed a partnership with a prominent physician, Dr. C. S. Nellis, in the same business. At the end of two years Mr. Driver bought out the interest of Dr. Nellis and continued the business himself until the year 1882, when he found it necessary to meet his rapidly increasing patronage by taking a partner in the person of his son George. They added to the already well established retail house a wholesale department. This partnership continued until 1895, when the son retired, since which time Mr. Driver has conducted his business establishment alone.

In 1871 the great transcontinental railroads, the Union Pacific and Central Pacific, being in operation, gave an impetus to all commercial and industrial enterprise. At this period Ogden was only a village of about 3,000 inhabitants, but with an increasing population there came a corresponding increase of all classes of business establishments. From the one drug store at that time there are now some ten or more establishments of this kind in Ogden City.

Mr. Driver, by his genial, familiar personality and his honorable business principles has never failed to be in the lead. As a business man he has been perseveringly enterprising and public spirited. It is due to the energy, pluck and adventurous spirit of such men as William Driver that Ogden now ranks as a great railroad and commercial center, the second city in the state of Utah.

Mr. Driver at all time, aside from personal affairs, has taken a most pronounced and active part in city government and in all matters affecting the growth and permanent upbuilding of this city and the great commonwealth of the State of Utah. It is a pleasure to note that as a successful business man his name will be perpetuated in the person of his son George, for whom is predicted a long and success-
